
Treasure Galore!

Throughout history, Portuguese explorers gathered treasures like new technologies, new resources, and new paths around the world. You've been on a voyage all summer, collecting the treasure of new stories, new experiences, and new adventures. Fill the chests below with all of the treasure *you* have gathered as you've read throughout the holidays! Completing each activity in this book will earn you one or more pieces of treasure. As you complete the activities, color in the pieces of treasure in numerical order (1, 2, 3, etc.). If your treasure is in the first chest, you'll earn bronze. If you start filling the second treasure chest, you'll earn silver. And, if you can earn enough treasure to put coins in the third chest, you'll earn gold! For the student who does EVERYTHING, diamond level status is achieved!

You have the opportunity to Set Sail for Adventure aboard the S.S. Summer Reading! On this ocean voyage you can win yourself a bronze, silver, gold, or diamond medal by participating in our reading adventures. Each adventure is slightly different, with combinations of reading, writing, drawing, etc., and treasure is earned differently in each adventure. Read the instructions carefully!

Keep track of what you've read by recording books on each page. Keep track of your treasure by coloring in coins on the back page.

You can read in any language that you speak. If you read in a language other than English, make a note to show the language beside the book. For example, (Port) to show that you read it Portuguese.

White can mean: Peace, honesty, freedom, innocence

Green can mean: Nature, safety, hope, harmony

Yellow can mean: Wealth, sun, happiness, generosity



Sailor Selfie!



Captain's Log

Ship captains keep a log as a record of the details of their voyage. Long ago, before we had maps of the whole world, a detailed captain's log had the only clues that other captains could use to get to a location that had been newly discovered.

Help others follow your journey on the S.S. Summer Reading by keeping your Captain's Log of reading adventures up-to-date. Keep your log in a convenient place so you can easily record your path through the ocean of books available to you!

To earn treasure, read, read out loud, or listen to reading at least 4 times per week for at least 10 minutes each time. Record the date and number of minutes you read. And, like a good ship's captain, observe the weather at that time and record your observation using words or pictures. For each completed week, add one piece of treasure to your chests for a maximum of 12 pieces of treasure.


